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
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A Holly Jolly Good Meeting



Remembering Their Faces

Last November a visitor came to the museum with a proposal for the members. Stephen Adams is a professor at Mohawk College and is one of the founding members of a project called Remembering Their Faces. The project utilizes computer aided facial recognition technology to help family members obtain photographs of loved ones that are archived in museums and personal collections. The team uses photographic and computer technology to scan pictures into a data base. Any additional information such as dates, names and locations are attached to the uploaded pictures. Through the group's website, users can upload a personal photo of a loved one who served in the Canadian Forces and the software will search the entire data base and show the user any additional photos that may contain the individual in the original photo. Thus allowing family and loved ones the opportunity of finding pictures that they may have never known existed.

The program has already partnered with The National Airforce Museum of Canada and started the arduous process of digitizing their photo library. In January, a formal contract was signed which partners No.6 RCAF Dunnville Museum with Remembering Their Faces which will result in every photograph in the museum's possession being scanned and added to the database. Entering into this agreement will aid in the process of telling the stories of the personnel who served at No.6 RCAF Dunnville to the world. During our initial meeting, Professor Adams stated that any and all help in the cataloging process will be appreciated and his team will gladly educate our members on how to assist with their efforts. We look forward to this adventure with our new partners and hope for your support when work days get posted.



Partners In Action

On February 1st, John and Brian represented No.6 RCAF Dunnville Museum at the Partners In Action breakfast meeting. The group consists of local organizations that host events, programs and fundraisers within the local community. Hosted at the local Optimist Hall, there was approximately 75 people in attendance representing groups including the Lions, Rotary and Optimist Clubs, as well as organizations like the Horticultural Society, Youth Impact Centre and Chamber of Commerce to name few. Leslie John Wearne

Les Wearne was born in Subiaco, Western Australia, in August of 1919. After enlisting in the Army at the outbreak of the Second World War, he found himself enthralled by the adventures of Royal Australian Air Force pilots being trained in Canada. In 1943 he left the army to follow his dream of becoming an aviator by enrolling in the British Commonwealth Air Training Program. After completing an Initial & Elementary Training Schools on the coasts of Australia, he found himself posted to #6 SFTS in Dunnville. Les was part of Course 106 - Section 2 and received his wings on November 17, 1944. As this was late in the war, this was to be the last course graduating from No.6. During his time in Dunnville Les made the most of his "down time" and travelled extensively through the area. These travels made a significant impact on his life as it was during this time that he met Elspeth Gibbon of Toronto, the woman whom he would marry on November 27, 1944 and raise 5 children with back in his native Australia. Les returned to Dunnville in 1985 and 1995 for the annual No.6 RCAF Dunnville Reunions. Les was a cherished member at No.6 and was known



as the last surviving graduate from

the air base. His picture adorns the front counter in the museum and it is one of the first items you see when you enter. Sadly, we were recently notified of Les' passing on October 19, 2024 at the age of 105 years. Our thoughts go out to his family and hope that they take comfort in the fact that his memory will live on here at No.6 RCAF Dunnville Museum as we continue to tell his story to all who visit.

The Curator's Committee

In response to the increasing list of responsibilities at the museum, a Curator's Committee has been formed. The committee, made up from active members, is tasked with maintaining, preserving and displaying the artifacts and possessions of the museum. The committee held its first meeting in January and moving forward, is set to hold monthly sessions. The first monumental task of the committee is to establish a data base of all of the artifacts and items that the museum possesses for the purposes of preserving and relating the stories of those who served at No.6 RCAF Dunnville. The members are collaborating to develop a digital inventory of all of the donated items on display and in storage. This consists of modifying existing software programs to meet our needs. Through this process all items will be assigned unique inventory identification numbers, their location within the museum will be documented, overall description and condition will be noted, and each item will be photographed. In addition to this, a new donation form will be created to record any new items given to the museum. Through this lengthy process, a comprehensive, detailed inventory will be kept digitally to ensure that all items may be located quickly when/if required. It will also serve to catalogue all of the artifacts on site to aid in future research projects. Finally, it will serve as an insurance ledger in case of an emergency such as a fire or flood.

In the year 2024 we held several raffles and lotteries, realizing a profit of \$3,532.81, being up considerably from 2023. This included the 50/50 raffles held at the monthly meetings, and also at the Eclipse Day, Home and Garden Show, Garage sale, Open House in July, as well as proceeds from the Super Draw.

The Super Draw 100 Lottery continues to be successful, we held our Elimination Draw in August. The evening consisted of dinner, entertainment, silent auction and the draws. The Elimination Draw realized a profit of \$1,494.81 and the Silent Auction \$692.00, however, we treated ourselves with entertainment by Elvis and dinner, after expenses realizing a profit of \$1,538.09.

Proceeds from the Lottery Account are used for museum expenses, public relations and advertising No. 6 to the public. A detailed Financial Statement giving full details of receipts and expenditures is included below.




