## Executive Committee Recommends Postponing 2022 Elections

COVID-19 pandemic restrictions have substantially disrupted many aspects of Museum operation over the last two years. Major projects have been postponed and fundraising and social activities cancelled or curtailed. The usual process for making major decisions (bringing recommendations to the general membership at monthly meetings for discussion and decision) has been disrupted. The few monthly meetings that were held were sparsely attended. Elections for officers and directors would normally be held this year. Nominations would be put forth at the February meeting, nominees would be asked to decline or stand for election at the March meeting, and the members present at the March meeting would vote, including any proxies received in advance.

In addition to the sparse attendance at the few meetings that have been held (not representative of the extent of the membership), the February meeting has been cancelled and the status of the March meeting is in doubt.

After much discussion, current officers and directors all declared their willingness to continue in their positions for another year.

# **2021 Lottery Report**

The year 2021 was again a year of challenges and, unfortunately, made it very difficult to fund raise, therefore, our proceeds from lotteries was down considerably from previous years.

We did have some raffles and lotteries, realizing a profit of \$2,013.05 combined, being down considerably from previous years. 50/50 raffles were held at the limited number of monthly meetings, and also at the yard sale, making a profit of \$415.00. We are very appreciative that Haldimand County extended the Lottery Licenses we had.

Word was received from Nevadaman in January advising that Avondale was no longer going to be selling Nevada tickets from their stores. This will be a considerable loss of revenue for No. 6. We realized a profit of \$7,000 to \$8,000 each year on the sales of these tickets. Letters were sent to Avondale expressing the importance of the selling of the tickets to our museum, but to no avail. An effort will be made to find another location to sell the tickets, but, unfortunately, there will be several charities looking for outlets, as several of the Avondale Stores in Dunnville sold Nevada tickets for the various service clubs and charities.

The Super Draw 100 Lottery continues to be successful. We were able to hold our Elimination Draw in August, with the theme "Christmas in August." The event was held taking as many precautions as we could to make it safe. The evening consisted of dinner, entertainment, silent auction, and the draws. The Elimination Draw realized a profit of \$1,492.55, and the Silent Auction \$773.50, for a total of \$2,265.80.

The decreased revenue received through the lotteries has not allowed us to cover as many expenses as in previous years, but did pay for some. A detailed Financial Statement giving full details of receipts and expenditures is included below.

The support and cooperation received from our members and the community is appreciated.

#### Yellow Rooster Is a **Popular Innovation** (Excerpt from The Skywriter, July 1943)

Among the many innovations at No. 6 Service Flying Training School is the "Yellow Rooster" - something to really crow about...a yellow slip of paper...is attached to daily routine orders twice a week, and ...contains a brief item concerning something really outstanding accomplished by the Station....[One] showed our rooster flying around a globe, at the top of which an inquisitive bear perched precariously on the top of a barber-striped North Pole. This little sheet carried information that in 1942, in flying hours and distance, aircraft from No. 6 S.F.T.S. flew considerably more than 400 times around the world.

#### Animal Life at the No. 6 SFTS Excerpts from The Skywriter

#### <u>Corporal Rochester – Base Mascot</u> (January 1943, from the obituary of Corporal Rochester)



Corporal Rochester enlisted on November 1st, 1940....The writer remembers very clearly his introduction to active service, when two airmen—among the first on the newly opened station—by means of

crumbs, coercion and cuss words lured him to the airport where he soon made his home....

No part of the airport was out of bounds to Rochester and he was seldom late for parade. It was really odd to see him, eager and alert, in front of the band, and on the first beat of the drum he was away, marching as smartly and with as much pride as any man on parade. No social functions could be held on the Station unless Corporal Rochester placed his seal of approval on them.

[He] enjoyed another privilege-he was the only member of the Station personnel to enjoy free rides on the bus, but in spite of the fact that he never paid, he was insistent that he have a seat of his own choosing, and it was more than anyone dare do to insist upon him relinguishing it....If perchance Rochester should miss the bus, he was sure of the company of at least two or three airmen, for [he] knew more tricks when it came to hiking than the man who first invented the idea. Corporal Rochester would walk sedately into the road in front of a car. If the driver failed to recognize him or refused to stop, Rochester knew another trick, and would leisurely lie down in front of the next one, which was practically forced to stop, and when the car door was opened, Rochester nonchalantly climbed in and waited for the ride either to or from the airport. And his choice of cars that were actually going to the airport was really uncanny....

Regulations probably would not permit a full military funeral for Corporal Rochester, but it is safe to say that when he was buried, he had an escort--official or otherwise--and his grave will never be neglected.

#### Gertrude Goat: Posted to Dunnville (June 1944)

Among recent W. D. arrivals to this station is AW2 Gertrude Goat, W-6<sup>7/8</sup>, pictured...as a civilian. Credit for her recruiting is owing to S/L Walsh, WO Champagne, WO Wingate, and Sgt. Stretton.



Affectionately known as "Gerty" by her many friends, AW2 Goat hails from Grimsby. She has already been on parade, has appeared at several dances, and has been officially introduced to the C.O. She has been classified provisionally as Mascot Standard, and her training here will be under the supervision of the Station Band.

#### (August 1944)

Gertie the Goat...is no respecter of position or protocol, as demonstrated recently, and she depends solely on her feminine wiles to get away with it.

During a recent officers' drill period on the parade square, Gertie broke loose from her keeper and wandered into the midst of the marching officers.

Flying Officer Gemmill attempted to shoo Gertie, but Gertie wasn't going to be shooed. His persuasive powers exhausted, F/O Gemmill ordered the offending goat removed.

The remover was Flying Officer Allan. He pulled Gertie from the front. Nothing happened. He pushed her from behind. Nothing



happened. The harder he pulled and pushed, the deeper Gertie dug her hooves into the tarmac.

In desperation the officer grabbed her by the horns and tail, and pulled both ends simultaneously. Even this ungentlemanly conduct didn't budge Gertie.

In the end, Flying Officer Gemmill ordered Gertie to be carried off and tied to the flagpole. Thus rudely interrupted in her play, Gertie watched the remainder of the drill period with a baleful eye.

#### Umbriago: Right From the Horse's Mouth (June 1944)

Umbriago, the horse with the Air Force career, was bought by WOII Jack McGeehan, WOI Bud Milligan and P/O Ward McConnell for \$60, with a rig and bag of feed thrown in to clinch the deal. Umbriago is sweet sixteen, sway back, and can fly like the wind, but only in an up and down motion (she would do better on a merry-go-round). She's a wayward little thing, running away twice, once in Port Maitland and once in town. The resplendent hack drawn by the graceful and elegant Umbriago makes frequent trips to Port Maitland.
