Don Oatman Receives Leadership Award

At the August 14 General Meeting, Don Oatman was presented with a special award acknowledging his dedicated leadership of the Museum. The award is etched glass and reads:

Presented to Don Oatman In recognition of your Outstanding Leadership as President of No. 6 RCAF Dunnville Museum 2002-2020



The Flags of Remembrance initiative honours veterans, RCMP members, and first responders. Every year, rows of flags are erected at only a few locations across Canada. This year, Dunnville was one of two locations in Ontario hosting the flags. Wingfield Park was the Dunnville site.

A maple-leaf-shaped plaque bearing the name of an individual or group honoured is attached to each flagpole. The Museum sponsored a flag in honour of those who trained at the No. 6 SFTS.

A dedication ceremony took place on September 11. The flags were on display until Veterans Day, at which time the flags and plaques were given to the sponsors.

A Tribute to Ann Ramsay

I was born in Dunnville but grew up in Port Colborne. My mother and her sister were emigrants from Scotland along with Ann Ramsay who settled in Dunnville.

My aunt married a local man and they had a farm on Marshagan Road near Moulton Station. As a result, my family visited Dunnville often. As a young boy I remember visiting the Dunnville Airport during World War II when it was a training school for airmen from Canada and other countries. The training school held "open house" days once or twice a year when the public was invited to visit the airport. As well, the planes used for training pilots were often seen in the air in the surrounding area.

Ann Ramsay was a friend of my aunt's, I believe they knew each other in Scotland before coming to Canada. Ann married a local commercial fisherman, Henry Crosby, who fished in Lake Erie out of Port Maitland. They lived at 231 Main Street E. in Dunnville. The Crosbys often entertained young trainees from the Airport, particularly those from other countries. I remember being at the Crosby home a number of times when there were trainees present. One of these trainees, Ian Rankin from New Zealand, subsequently married their daughter Jean and they moved to New Zealand after the war. Sadly, I don't believe the Crosbys ever saw their daughter again, no doubt due to the great distance between Canada and New Zealand. Their only other child, a son Robert, was lost overboard early in the war while serving in the Royal Navy. He was the first Canadian casualty from Dunnville.

For many years, Ann looked after the graves of the trainees who died during training and are buried in Riverside Cemetery. She passed away in 1962.

New Museum Display: The Lalor Trophy

While most of the artifacts in the Museum are directly related to the history of the No. 6 SFTS, visitors find artifacts from World Wars I and II and aviation memorabilia as well. In the last few years, the Museum has also graciously provided space for artifacts related to the history of its host town. The No. 6 SFTS had a close relationship with the town and its residents, many of whom were employed at the base.

On September 5, the Museum was pleased to accept a unique Dunnville treasure--the Lalor Trophy. Impressive in size and topped by a silver-plated cup, the Trophy was donated by F.R. Lalor to the Dunnville Lawn Bowling Club in 1917. The donation coincided with the arrival of the Club at its new and final location on Main Street.

Mr. Lalor was an important figure in Dunnville's history. He served as member of parliament, was a

founder of the Monarch Knitting Co. (Dunnville's all-time largest employer), and a pillar of the community.



The first year of competition for the Lalor Trophy was 1918. The arrival of 55 teams (220 bowlers) to compete in a one-day tournament on the Dunnville lawn bowling greens attests to the importance of the Trophy. The Wettlaufer team from Kitchener was victorious. Besides taking home the coveted Lalor Trophy, members were presented with sports coats made, of course, by the Monarch Knitting Co.

The Lalor Trophy was originally intended to be in competition for 10 years, with the club winning the most times allowed to keep the Trophy at its club. A problem arose with a tie between the Buffalo and St. Catharines clubs. Meanwhile, Mr. Lalor became ill and passed away in 1929. The Dunnville Club voted to keep the Trophy in competition in his memory.

As a result, the Lalor Trophy remained in competition for over 100 years. The final year the Trophy was played in Dunnville was 2016, with Tom

and David Pettigrew winning. From then until 2021, the Trophy was at the St. Catharines Glenridge Club for one of their tournaments.

At the final meeting of the Dunnville Lawn Bowling Club, it was voted that the Lalor Trophy should return and permanently reside in Dunnville.

While there is no record that those based at the No. 6 SFTS played on the Dunnville greens, some of the servicemen came from countries where lawn bowling was popular, such as Australia, New Zealand, and England. It is likely, they would have taken advantage of the Dunnville facility.
